#### FROM OUR PASTOR - REV JAMES HAMILTON

Dear Friends,

## "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under Heaven." Ecclesiastes 3 verse 1

I'm a great believer in seasons, not just the seasons of Summer, Autumn, Winter and Spring, but other seasons in life. I aways look forward to the new football season resuming and, when the weather improves, to a new season for playing golf. In spite of being Scottish, I also quite like the start of the new cricket season! Of course soon we will be entering the Season of Advent when we look forward to the celebration of Christmas again (more of that later).

Every season has a beginning and an end, and as I look back on my seventy-seven years I think of special seasons in my own life. There was the season of study, from schooldays through university and theological college, the season of marriage, parenthood and grandparenthood that continues, and of course the seasons of my three pastorates as a minister in Scotland, Shoeburyness and now Ramsden Bellhouse. Each of the first two seasons had a beginning and end and in each of them I knew when it was time for that season to come to an end. My season with you all at Ramsden Bellhouse began unexpectedly just over ten years ago and it has been very different from the first two but equally joyous and fulfilling with many wonderful memories. I am sure, however, that this season is now coming to an end, and so the 28th of January will be my last Sunday with you, and this will be my last article in our church magazine.

In so many ways the end of the season will be sad as I have enjoyed every minute of being your pastor, but Pauline and I are sure that this is the right time for us, and also for the church to seek someone new to take over the reins. We will be praying that a new minister can be appointed soon and that the mission and witness of the church in the village and beyond can develop and prosper.

I want to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to so many of you for making our time at Ramsden Bellhouse so special. Your support, encouragement and willingness to try new things, adopt new ideas and

step out in faith have constantly inspired Pauline and me and made the round trip from Shoeburyness a constant pleasure for us. There are of course some regrets, I would love to have seen the church grow more, I wish we could have had more baptismal services, it would have been lovely to have been able to start a work for children and young people, and we have been so sorry that we have not been able to live in the village and identify more with the people who live here. The joys and blessings have outweighed all these things for us however, and we are so grateful that God has given us this wonderful season before allowing us to have a "Full" retirement. Thank you to all of you who have joined us and played a part in this special season, please support the leaders as they seek a new pastor and especially, please continue to attend, support and commit to this very special church made up of very special people. Noone is irreplaceable and remember that with God, when one season ends, another always begins.

Before my season ends with you we will be celebrating another Christmas season together. It is always a special season. This year we will be having our usual Carols by Candlelight service on the 17th of December at 4pm and again we will be joined by the choir from Downham School as well as our own "Little Drummer Boy" Mikey taking part. The service also includes our usual collection of toys (new) and tins for distribution to families and others in need, so we hope you will join us. There will be seasonal refreshments as usual after the service. There won't be a service on Christmas Day which is on a Monday but there will be a service on Christmas Eve at 10.30am as usual. Christmas is always so special for us as Christians when we celebrate the coming of Jesus into our world as a tiny, vulnerable baby to an ordinary family to bring hope and peace to those who commit their lives to Him. As I write this, the war in Ukraine continues and the terrible events in Israel and Gaza still dominate every newscast. It is ironic that it is to the very heart of this place of conflict that Jesus came. In John's Gospel chapter 1 Jesus is described like this, "The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world." A little later John adds that "He came to his own, but they did not receive Him." If only they had received Him!

As we celebrate this Christmas season at the end of my season with you, there are two things that I am praying for. The first is that you will truly receive Jesus this Christmas, either for the first time or in a new and fresh

way. John tells us that if we do, we have the right to be included in God's own family. Isn't that wonderful? My second prayer is that whatever terrible things are happening in our world, and even here at home in our country and community, you will experience peace that can only come through faith in Jesus who is "The Prince of Peace."

Whatever season you are in in your life, may this Christmas season be one of the best ever because Jesus will be at the very heart of it.

#### 'THE RUNAWAY' Rev Raymond Bolton

One day in 1950 or 1951 a sixteen-year-old girl knocked on the door of the manse and said she had run away from home. I knew Betty (not her real name) as she was the only member of her family who came to church. Plainly we could not turn her away, so we invited her in. She showed no sign of physical injury and the only reason for her decision that I can remember was that she slept in her parents' bed. Nowadays that would inevitably lead to suggestions of sexual abuse, but she never mentioned that, and, in those more innocent days, it wouldn't have occurred to us.

In case she had been reported as a missing person I phoned the local police station, but they were not interested. As Betty was above school age she could live wherever she liked, and she had a job working in the local laundry. No-one thought about health and safety, or child protection, then. But what were we to do, as we couldn't take her into our home? I consulted several people in the church and found an answer unexpectedly quickly.

One of our church members was a widow of about sixty who had no family of her own. She lived in a small cottage and was not in very good health, but she offered to accommodate Betty for whatever the girl could pay from her wages. I suppose that she had a need for companionship, and it certainly answered our problem.

By the time we moved on to our next church, Betty had restored relationships with her family, but she continued to live with the widow. Because of the disparity in their ages, the older woman must have died at some point. Did she leave her property to Betty? Did Betty ever get married and have her own family? I have no idea, but some years later the area was redeveloped, and the cottages are no longer there. If she is still alive, Betty would be an old lady herself now. I wonder if she ever tells anyone of the day she turned up on our door step?

### HARVEST SERVICE 24<sup>TH</sup> SEPTEMBER 2023 Jenny Jacques

Our harvest service this year focused on the bounty of God reflected at harvest time. Our minister Jim's sermon talked about how we are the harvest and that we can be fruitful in reaching out to others with God's wonderful love and compassion.

As always, the church was beautifully decorated with produce that was later sent to St Luke's Hospice and Billericay FoodBank, in both cases very well received.

Each year at harvest time we also support a Christian charity with our monetary giving. This year we helped BMS World Mission. formerly known as the Baptist Missionary Society, with their appeal for the farmers of Uganda who have suffered failed harvests for many years. Support is needed to educate users of the land in the use of products and methods and in the provision of tools. We



raised £540, which BMS will use to enable poorer communities to grow their own crops and become self-sufficient.

We had a special treat during the service when we welcomed Mikey to play the drums alongside Jim on guitar and David on the keyboard for one of the songs. This was greeted with an enthusiastic round of applause. In fact, so good was the performance that we had an encore at the end of the service!

The photograph on the previous page, used with permission, shows them practicing before the service, and some of the donated harvest produce which filled the platform by the end of the service.

#### **BILLERICAY FOODBANK - Christmas ... it's in the bag!**



This was celebrated by a Service of Thanksgiving held at Queens Park Community Church. It was extremely well attended; both by Billericay Street Pastors and local dignitaries from the Borough and local councils, police, and church groups. During the celebration a Street Pastor commissioning ceremony was held to welcome a new member to the Street Pastor group, a young girl who was also celebrating her recent eighteenth birthday.



The **Street Pastor** Info-graph above (January to October 2023 operations) demonstrates the activity level and involvement with our local


community in Billericay and the various areas of community support

A similar info-graph for the associated **Rail Pastors** (see below), shows the work and activities of this group since it recommenced operations in June of this year.




Their work is very specifically designed to provide mental and spiritual support, as well as suicide prevention specialisation, to those working on and using the local railway network.

#### Sums up Christmas


Three phrases that sum up Christmas are: 'Peace on Earth'; 'Goodwill to Men'; and 'Batteries not included'.
